Hi everyone!

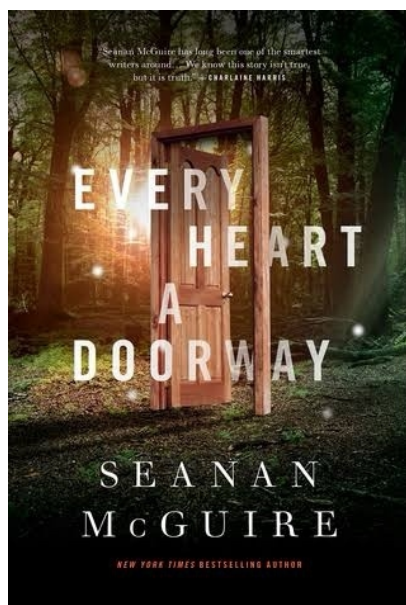
Have you been enjoying some great books lately?

The **first** book of the year for me was *Every Heart a Doorway* by Seanan McGuire.

This book is the first of the Wayward Children series and follows children who have been sent to Eleanor West's Home for Wayward Children. These young people have one main thing in common – they have all been to fantasy worlds through various

types of 'doorways', such as wardrobes, rabbit holes and old wells. These children face their own challenges and deal with the consequences of going to, and ultimately returning from, worlds different from our own. Nancy is one such child and, as the newest student, she is trying to find her feet. When tragedy strikes the school, all students must work together to understand what is going on.

I enjoyed the concept of this book. It provides a unique angle of the fairytales, stories and fantasy fiction that most of us have grown up with. There is a lot of diversity, which is great, though I did feel like it was a bit too didactic at times, trying to squeeze as many lessons and views it possibly could into a small book. It was intriguing and I recommend it, particularly to readers from about 10 to 16 years of age.

I gave it **3 out of 5 stars**.

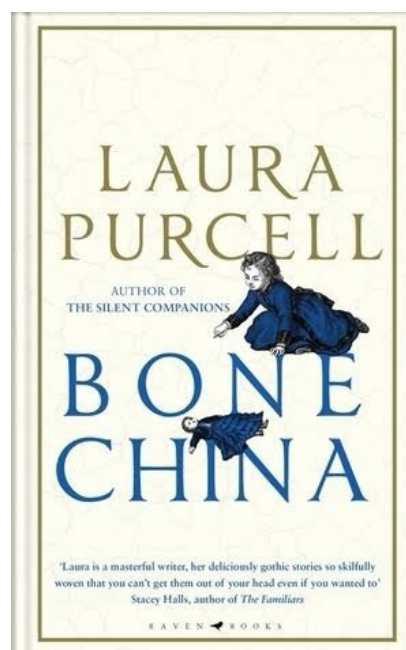
Celeste is an Aussie, and a hilarious one at that! She began

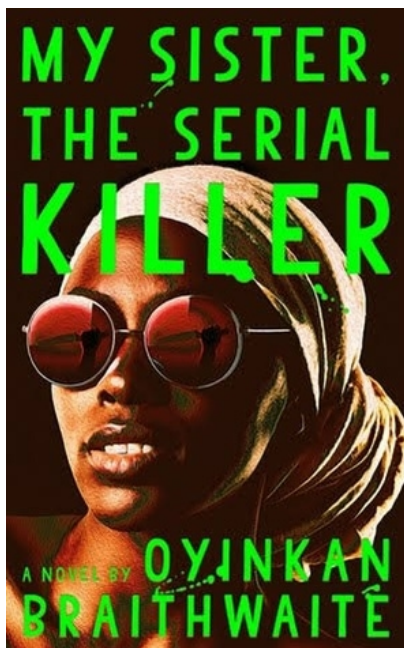
I read another of Laura's books, *The Corset*, last year and loved it, so I was so keen to get to this one. Unfortunately,

I was disappointed and found it dragged. I really had to push myself to finish it, which I wanted to do because *The Corset* was so good – I thought maybe I would end up enjoying it. This book follows a young woman who goes to work as a servant at a mysterious house after doing something bad in her previous place of work. While strange things happen in this house, the book moves from different times and perspectives, including that of the lady of the house when she was young. The general storyline seemed too similar to *The Corset* to feel like I was reading something new and interesting, and for me, it lacked the level of intrigue and mystery it seemed to be aiming for. I love Laura's writing, it's beautiful and haunting, and I will absolutely read more of her work – I just didn't gel with this book, sadly!

I gave it **3 out 5 stars**

It follows Korede as she cleans up, metaphorically *and* literally, after her sister, Ayoola, who, as the title implies, keeps killing her boyfriends. This is a clever book told with dark humour and a unique writing style, and considers what 'family comes first' can really mean. When Ayoola meets a man who Korede has strong feelings for, she starts to wonder whether she is supporting the right person. If saving one person means sacrificing another, who would you choose? This book really held my attention and I was keen to pick it up every chance I had, and was frequently laughing throughout.

I gave it **4 out of 5 stars**.
